This summary outlines how our school provides music education for all pupils across three key areas: curriculum music, co-curricular opportunities, and musical experiences. It also highlights the developments we plan to introduce in the coming years. This information is intended to help pupils, parents, and carers understand what our school offers and the partnerships we have in place to support our music provision.

Part A: Curriculum music

This section explains what is taught during lesson time, the amount of time allocated to music, and the music qualifications or awards that pupils can work towards and achieve.

At Woodford Primary School, our music curriculum is designed to inspire a lifelong love of music, nurture creativity, and develop every child's musical skills and confidence. Music is taught across all year groups using the Charanga Music scheme, which meets the statutory requirements of the National Curriculum (2014).

The curriculum is organised on a termly basis to ensure clear progression, enabling children to build on their knowledge and skills over time. This structured approach ensures that every child, regardless of their starting point, can learn more and remember more.

Curriculum:

At Woodford Primary School, we implement the Charanga (Creative Music Scheme). The Charanga music scheme is designed to cover the National

Curriculum for music fully, ensuring teachers meet the statutory requirements whilst offering children creative freedom. Lesson sequences are designed to build listening skills, strengthen vocal and instrumental technique, and foster improvisation and composition, allowing children's progress to be clearly monitored over time. Lessons provide a wide range of musical experiences, including singing, movement, storytelling through performance, and ensemble work. They also promote cross-curricular connections, inspire and engage children, and nurture a lasting love of music.

Music at EYFS:

At Woodford Primary School, music is embedded throughout the year and forms a key part of the specific area Expressive Arts: Being Imaginative. Musical activities are closely aligned with the objectives of the Early Learning Goals, supporting the development of children's creativity and expressive skills from an early age.

Inclusion and SEND support in Music:

At Woodford Primary School, our music curriculum is designed to be inclusive, with adaptations in place to support all learners, including those with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND). These strategies include providing additional time to practise skills, offering alternative instruments, and making sensory adjustments.

Part B: Extra-curricular music

This refers to the opportunities available for pupils to sing and play music beyond lesson time, including participation in choirs, ensembles, and bands, and the ways in which they can continue to develop and make progress in music outside the core curriculum.

Music Tuition:

Pupils at Woodford Primary School can begin music lessons through IMS (Instrumental Musical Services). Lessons take place on school premises and can be arranged and paid for by scanning the QR code below.

The purpose of these lessons is to help pupils develop musical skills, build confidence, and foster creativity in a supportive and engaging environment. Through regular tuition, students can improve their technique, enhance concentration and listening skills, and gain a deeper appreciation of music.

Instruments available include guitar, piano, drums, and violin.

Additional music opportunities:

Mrs Carpenter, the Music Lead, runs a Drama Club in collaboration with other teaching staff, with the aim of producing a summer musical performed for the school community and parents. This provides pupils with valuable opportunities to develop their performance skills, confidence, teamwork, and stage presence. They use the Schools Musical Company resources to build and strengthen the performance.

Part C: Musical events

This is about all the other musical events and opportunities that we organise, such as singing in assembly, concerts and shows, and trips to professional concerts.

At Woodford Primary School, we recognise the value of musical performance in nurturing confidence, resilience, and a sense of joy in our pupils. We want to collaborate with external providers to offer enriching live music experiences, broadening children's exposure to a range of styles and performers. Our music curriculum is further strengthened by a variety of whole-school musical events held throughout the year:

Christmas Nativity Performances:

Children in the Early Years Foundation Stage rehearse and perform a selection of Christmas songs, alongside a simple retelling of the Nativity story. In Key Stage 1, pupils prepare and perform a Christmas-themed production, further developing their singing, storytelling, and performance skills.

Fortnightly singing assemblies:

Fortnightly singing assemblies, often led by our Music Lead, bring the whole school together to explore a wide range of musical genres and songs. These assemblies unite children across year groups in collective singing and provide regular rehearsal opportunities.

End of year Key Stage showcase of musical talent:

An end-of-year Key Stage musical showcase is a celebratory performance that highlights pupils' musical growth and achievements across the academic year. The event brings together individual and group performances—such as singing, instrumental pieces, ensembles, and sometimes composition work—allowing pupils to demonstrate the skills they have developed in lessons and extracurricular activities.

The purpose of the showcase is to build confidence, encourage creativity, and provide a real-world performance experience. It also strengthens the school community by giving families and peers the opportunity to recognise pupils' hard work and progress.

Through preparing for the showcase, pupils develop a range of musical and transferable skills, including performance technique, teamwork, listening and appraisal, stage presence, rehearsal discipline, resilience, and self-expression.

Overall, the event celebrates achievement while reinforcing the value of commitment, collaboration, and artistic growth.
